One of the major reasons for India's performance being not that encouraging was the suboptimal investment on higher education in the recent past. decisive force of growth. This necessitates massive investment in higher education so that the availability of internationally acceptable highly skilled manpower can be ensured. As a part of India's integration into the world economy the role played by potential foreign participants needs a special mention. The impact of potential entrants on the Indian higher education system can be felt in most of the functional areas like access, equity and quality. Moreover, in view of the inherent lapses in the regulatory structure of the system, unregulated foreign participation may lead to unfair and exploitative practices; to mention a few: high capitation fees, misrepresentation of courses and corruption in admission process which may further accentuate the functional and ideological differences. Thus, in order to ensure excellence and reasonable match between demand and supply of globally acceptable labour, a striking balance has to be restored between accessibility to a world-class educational system and model national values, ethics and standards.

NATIONAL CONFERENCE ON "EMERGING TECHNOLOGIES IN COMPUTER ENGINEERING"

Department of Computer Science & Engineering successfully conducted a National Conference on Emerging Technologies in Computer Engineering under the technical co-sponsorship of Computer Society Chapter, IEEE, Delhi Section and in association with HCL on 3 Nov. 2012. The conference aimed to deliberate on the enabling infrastructure, policies and resources, and identify the critical success factors that build and sustain initiatives in Computer Engineering and Information Technology.

The conference included focused panels, discussions and sessions providing a unique opportunity for participants to share knowledge, information, news, views and network with peers and experts from the country. The conference included three plenary and three parallel sessions comprising 48 speakers and over 113 participants including key decision-makers from government, industry leaders, practitioners and academicians from all over the country.

The eminent guests and dignitaries who graced the occasion included Mr. Rakesh Verma, IAS, Principal Secretary, Planning Department, Government of Rajasthan, Mr. Daman Dev Sood, CIO and Head- Sustainability Practice, IEEE Ambassador, India, Mr. Ripu Daman Associate Vice President, HCL Infosystems, Jaipur, Mr. Vinit Goyal, Manager, Infosys Technologies Ltd., Mr. Rajesh K. Jeypaul, Technology Executive, IBM Innovation Center, Bangalore, IBM India, Dr. V. K. Dubey, Retired Chief Scientist, CEERI Pilani, Prof. (Dr.) V. K. Chaubey, Professor & HOD, BITS Pilani.

The IBM panel session was organized to discuss the theme "Meeting the Industry Demand by Academia". The objective was to explore the possibility of having a customized curriculum as per the needs of the industry. There were various experts from IBM, HCL, Infosys, CEERI and also from Rajasthan Technical University. This session was chaired by Prof. R. P. Yadav, Hon'ble Vice Chancellor, Rajasthan Technical University, Kota. He delineated the requirements of the industry and insisted on student orientation in view of it. He also motivated the participants by narrating the industry's experiences of using the expertise of students, an initiative aimed at bridging the gap between it and the academia. Mr. Rohit Khanna, General Manager, IBM laid out before the participants the expectations of the industry in terms of skills, knowledge and attitude. He also apprised the audience of IBM's initiative to create a skilled and competitive IT workforce.

Mr. Ripu Daman outlined the various skills like analytical skill, communication skill and team work which are essential for success. Mr. Vineet Goyal defined the dedicated, disciplined and motivated attitude of industry professionals. Dr. V. K. Dubey explained the importance of practical knowledge and stressed upon frequent industry-academia interactions.



In Technical Session - I the chairperson Prof. (Dr.) V. K. Chaubey, HOD, BITS, Pilani delivered an expert talk on the themes of web applications and security and software product development. Another invited talk was given by Mr. Ajeet Mishra from Oracle India who discussed important facts of databases. In this session, 15 papers were presented on software development and web applications.

In Technical Session - II, the chairperson Mr. Rajesh K. Jeypaul from IBM India, Bangalore spoke about "Cloud Computing: Energy consideration in clouds". In this session various participants presented 12 papers on data mining and database systems, artificial intelligence & fuzzy logic.

In Technical Session - III, the chairperson Prof. (Dr.) Anil Kumar Dahiya, HOD, CSE, Manipal University spoke to the audience on the Cryptology. His speech was followed by a presentation session which included themes like image processing, network security and various other issues.

Undoubtedly this day-long interface unveiled the challenges and set forth illuminating ideas, fresh insights and alternative ways of thinking about the competitive yet cooperative combat that the world of computing is readying itself for.

REPUBLIC DAY CELEBRATION

SKIT celebrated the 64 Republic day in an atmosphere redolent with patriotism and a deep feeling of gratitude for the freedom fighters. The celebration began with the flag hoisting ceremony.



Mr. Surja Ram Meel, chairman, SKIT, expressed his concern over the declining enthusiasm in the student community about national days. He spoke about the sacrifices of freedom fighters which can prove fruitful only if every Indian is committed to the service of the country. He exhorted the youths to be inspired by Swami Vivekananda and Swami Keshvanand who had no resources at their disposal and yet contributed so much towards social development. He invoked the teaching community to find time in their periods to teach ethics to students. He also articulated his deep concern over the decreasing values in the society.

Prof. (Dr.) S. L. Surana, Director Academics regretted that though SKIT is committed to an all round development of students, they still get misguided and fail to be regular in their classes. He urged the students to be sincere in their duties towards their parents, society and the country. He said that

honesty, discipline and integrity are essential to be successful in life.

Prof. M. L. Bhargava, Advisor, asked the would be engineers to have an analytical approach and inspired them to take initiative and put our nation on the highest pedestal in the international arena.

Mr. Ashish Nayyar, Reader, Dept. of ME, talked about the generation gap. Prof. N. K. Banthia, Head, Dept. of ME, read out an excerpt reminding us of the legacy of our predecessors. He also proposed a vote of thanks.

His start-ups like Gaon Connection, a rural newspaper of its own kind and India's first writer led band, Band Called Nine, are examples of his inventiveness. He has written film songs like Jaadu hai Nasha hai (Jism), Bepanaah Pyaar hai (Krishna Cottage), I am in love (Once Upon A Time In Mumbai), Anjaana Anjaani Ki Kahani (Anjaana Anjaani), Banjaara (Ek tha Tiger), Kyon (Barfi) and many more.

He described moments of his childhood, his struggle while working as a journalist with the Associated Press and his rapport with Bollywood. He asked the students to pursue their wished goals to achieve insurmountable heights of success. The interactive session was followed by a question-and-answer round in which he revealed some secrets of his life and also sang a song of his choice.

A HUNDRED RUPEE VENTURE

It's a venture, let's get, set and go,
Let's give it a try, let's give it a blow.
Money is what we have to grow,
It's all thumbs up, no room for no.
Just go for it, your ideas would flow,
Pennies and pounds will surely glow.

On Sunday, 25 November 2012 TOPAZ, the E-cell of SKIT, organised a 'Hundred Rupee Venture' exercise for students. This activity saw a great buzz as all the students were eager to

register themselves and start their one-day venture.

The pre-briefing session for the exercise was conducted by Prof. M. L. Bhargava, Advisor, SKIT and Ms. Maneesha Kaushik, Training and Placement Officer. Prof. Bhargava discussed the ethics associated with business and explained how to pursue a business venture.

The activity was organised keeping in view the following objectives:-

- To understand the process of entrepreneurship.
- To transform apprehensions into enthusiasm.
- To fine tune presentation skills - 5 minute pitch.
- To set the stage for writing a business plan.

Though the very idea of a business venture sounds very dazzling, a pinch of rules and regulations makes it all the more challenging.

The participants were instructed to follow the following rules:-

- Participants need to form groups of a minimum of 2 and maximum of 5 members.
- Each group can put in Rs.100 only as the initial investment.
- The groups must use the initial investment.
- Every member must be involved in the activity.
- There are no restrictions on what the teams can do with the money to make profits (provided it is legal, ethical and moral).
- Each group requires to make a 3-slide 5 minute pitch of their one-day venture.

The event was judged by Ms. Preeti Singh, NEN co-ordinator and head, Rajasthan Chapter, Mr. Adarsh Pandey, Associate Professor, MBA, SKIT and Mr. Harminder Singh. The debriefing session of the exercise was conducted by Ms. Maneesha Kaushik, co-ordinator, EDC, TOPAZ. She explained the procedures and the challenges of the activity.

As glittering trophies and awards are one of the important highlights of any event, the 'Hundred Rupee Venture' exercise also saw the teams emerging as winners among a total of ten teams. The prizes were given in the following four categories:-

1. TOPAZ Entrepreneur Award (Overall Best Performance)
2. Innovative Entrepreneur Award (Most Innovative Idea)
3. Big Bucks Award (Most Profitable Idea)
4. Exceptional Entrepreneur Award (Best Revenue Model)



CYBER CRIME AGAINST WOMEN IN INDIA

Cyber crime is a global phenomenon. With the rise of technology, cyber crime and victimization of women are high and pose a major threat to their security. The new trend is observed that even illiterate women are falling prey to cyber crimes. Another disturbing factor is the alarming rate of divorce in the country, which is also fuelled by some of the cyber crimes committed on women. Many chat-based friends or Facebook-hooked buddies today enjoy teasing their lady friends by using words such as "awesome body", "sexy", and "attractive" etc., which are actually the beginning of obscenity. They slowly take their female friends into confidence and start discussing about their own problems like a true homely friend. The emotionally oppressed or family-wise depressed Indian woman is a soft target. These guys then turn their successful Net-based friendship into a strong bond and gradually proceed to send obscene or derogatory remarks and lascivious talks. It is also seen that if the recipient shies away, the sender of such messages becomes more encouraged to continue further. The problem would be arrested or solved only if the victimized lady reports back immediately or warns the abuser against the advances he is making and reminds him of strong action she can take under the law.

Even though India is one of the very few countries to enact IT Act 2000 to combat cyber crimes, issues regarding women still remain untouched in this Act. It terms certain offences as hacking, publishing of obscene material in the net, tampering the data as punishable offences. But the grave threat to the security of women in general is not covered fully by this Act.

Cyber bullying can affect everyone, including children. Safety Web provides support for parents to improve internet safety for kids.

Types of cyber crime that are committed against women:

Amongst the various cyber crimes committed against individuals and society at large the crimes which can be mentioned as specially targeting women are as follows: -

- **Harassment through e-mails** is not a new concept. It is very similar to harassing through letters. Harassment includes blackmailing, threatening, bullying, and even cheating via

email. E-harassment is similar to harassment through letters, but creates problems quite often when posted from fake ids.

- **Cyber stalking** is one of the most talked about net crimes in the modern world. The Oxford dictionary defines stalking as "pursuing stealthily". Cyber stalking involves following a person's movements across the Internet by posting messages (sometimes threatening) on the bulletin boards frequented by the victim, entering the chat-rooms frequented by the victim, constantly bombarding the victim with emails, etc. Cyber stalking usually occurs with women who are stalked by men, or children who are stalked by adult predators.
- **Cyber pornography** is the other threat to female netizens. This would include pornographic websites; pornographic magazines produced using computers (to publish and print the material) and the Internet (to download and transmit pornographic pictures, photos, writings etc).
- **Cyber defamation:** Cyber tort including libel and defamation is another common crime against women in the Net. This occurs when defamation takes place with the help of computers and / or the Internet. E.g., someone publishes defamatory matter about someone on a website or sends e-mails containing defamatory information to all of that person's friends.
- **Morphing:** Morphing is the editing of the original picture by an unauthorized user or fake identity. It was identified that female pictures are downloaded by fake users and again re-posted/uploaded on different websites by creating fake profiles after editing it. This amounts to violation of IT Act, 2000 and attracts sec. 43 & 66 of the said Act. The violator can be booked under IPC also. The Times of India reported that in October, a Delhi-based beautician told the police that her photograph had been flashed on a porno portal along with her mobile number.
- **Email spoofing:** A spoofed e-mail may be said to be one, which misrepresents its origin. It shows its origin to be different from where it actually originates. A review in CyberlawTimes.com shows that India has crossed the danger mark in cyber crime targeting women and children.

In general, the computer is a resort for an idle woman. Since the impersonator isn't in public, they feel anonymity works to their advantage and that they are safe. If they succeed in their first attempt, they are immediately hooked on to it. There's no looking back for them and soon it becomes an addiction, their virtual connects are closer than physical people.

Do's and Don'ts

- Don't ever put too much personal detail on Facebook, Google+, LinkedIn or other social networking sites as it

might get misused.

- Always make two kinds of online presence: a professional presence for your colleagues and clients, and a private presence for socializing. The presence should be with some online identity that consists of a dummy profile photo and details.
- Do not reveal your mother's name or your personal tastes, distastes, hobbies, which can be used to profile you and segregate you for targeted cyber crimes.
- Don't ever post your personal memoirs like snaps, where you are partying, or where you are on vacation. This helps to further profile you.
- Ensure that your private moments or bedroom pictures are not on your computers, which are hooked to the Internet and specifically on computers, where you download torrents.
- While in a hotel or in changing rooms of malls, ensure to check for a two-way mirror.
- Ensure that your Webcam on computer is plugged out when not in use, and mobile phones with camera are kept in reverse direction.

Indian women netizens are still not open to immediately report the cyber abuse or cyber crime. The biggest problem of cyber crime lies in the modus operandi and the motive of the cyber criminal. Cyber space is a transit space for many people, including offenders. While people do not live in cyber space, they come and go like any other place. This nature provides the offenders the chance to escape after the commission of cyber crime. Many websites and blogs provide security tips for the safety of women and children on the Net. But still cyber crimes against women are on the rise.

"YOUR PASSWORD IS DEAD"

Passwords, their impregnability is a myth. The idea that you can devise passwords to keep hackers away is an outdated, old-fashioned belief akin to protecting a city with a wall. The most common trick hackers use is the 'reset password' functionality that most websites provide. Most email accounts have straightforward methods of authentication that can be circumvented by a determined hacker. Even a two-factor authentication method – where a password reset involves a code sent to the account owner's mobile phone – can be bypassed.

The biggest weakness in any security system is the HUMAN MIND. Any authentication method that is acceptable to a 65 year old user will fall in seconds to a 14 year old hacker. Anybody could be a victim because of carelessness with email accounts, but mostly celebrities are the most targeted ones. The only way of being secured is that websites should make strong

authentication standards a priority. When asked how she herself kept her email account secure, a security firm head replied that she did so by not having one!

SMART GRIDS

The occurrence of power outage in the whole of Northern India in 2012 left 300 million people without power for 15 hours and even disrupted the normal functioning of the national capital. Grid failures have become frequent in India these days and have triggered major problems in the country. They reflect the inadequacy of India's infrastructure and have a negative impact on the country's economic activity. The current electrical power scenario in India stresses the need for integration of technology that enables efficient management of the use of power. The question however remains what steps are being taken to strengthen the system and avoid another blackout.

Through an audit of the protection systems, a fundamental re-engineering and restructuring process needs to be commissioned to curb over drawing of power. Energy losses in India's transmission and distribution sector exceed 30%, which is one of the highest in the world. Up-gradation in transmission and distribution systems coupled with the need to reduce electricity losses and theft is driving the future road map of smart grid technology in India. The real challenge in the power sector in India lies in managing the up-grading of the complex transmission, distribution and metering methods efficiently and compiling it with the existing network.

Shri Re ji Kumar Pillai, president of 'India Smart Grid Forum' observes "Indian power sector must leverage smart grid technologies to alleviate the perennial problems of the sector – huge transmission & distribution losses, power cuts, poor quality of supply and equipment failure. Smart grids can provide end to end visibility of the system in real time that will facilitate effective management of all sources of generation, transmission, distribution and consumption of electricity; and also contribute to optimized asset utilization, increased employee productivity and better customer service." For the same cause 'Smart Grid India Energy Efficiency Optimization' summit will be held on 20 & 21 February, 2013 in New Delhi that will throw light on the need to adopt grid and meter technologies that will pave the path to energy efficiency in India. The summit will host speakers such as Shri Re ji Kumar Pillai, Mr. Thor Hjartarson alongside Shri Tarun Kapoor from The Ministry of New and Renewable Energy and Shri V. Arunachalam from CPRI.
